"Changed to make a Difference"

Acts 3:1-10

Introduction:

Change Defined: to make the form, content, future course, etc., of something different from what it is or from what it would be if left alone; a **transformation** or modification; alteration.

Change is often **resisted** in the church.

- Yet God's Kingdom must be transformed into Christ's image and aim to change the world. -**Acts 1:8**

Our Text: Peter, John, and other disciples have been changed with the arrival of the Holy Spirit and have become transformed people (Acts 2); now they embark on a journey to change the world.

- * The example set for us: (1) we experience change <u>individually</u>; (2) we then get serious about changing the world and impacting our community.
- 1. The opportunity to transform lives will occur only after we have been transformed ourselves -

Acts 3:1

- A. Peter's transformation from the Gospels to **NOW**.
- John 13:36-38; Luke 22:32,61-62
- B. Peter and John are being faithful to transformation into the image of Christ: "going up to the temple at the time of prayer"
- C. God cannot effectively use us to change Middle Georgia if we do not allow him to change us Psalm 51:10-13
- D. God always changes his people **first**, then uses them to change others.
- 2. The opportunity to make a transformative impact in a person's life will sometimes occur unexpectantly -

Acts 3:2-5

- A. The purpose of their journey to the Temple was to pray; they were not expecting to heal a lame beggar.
- B. Their willingness to God's leading enabled them to make an impact in the beggar's life, even when not expecting to.
- C. Always stay sensitive to God's leading and ask God to open your eyes to those unexpected opportunities to change a person's life. -Philippians 2:4
- 3. We can only transform lives when we give what we have. -

Acts 3:6

THE HOUSE OF HOPE MACON

- A. What the beggar was looking for was not what they had to offer, nor was it what the beggar really **needed**.
- B. What did they have that the beggar needed? (what does the church have that the world needs)?
 - Faith... that God is in control; that God can forgive sin; that God can transform lives.
 - Hope... that the future can be brighter; that present failure isn't final; that God can make all things new.
 - Healing... of homes, of shattered dreams, of sin.
 - Life... abundant life; eternal life; new life.
- * It is not our job to convince the world, but to simply offer the world what we have in Christ.

1 Peter 3:15

- 4. Our attempt to change lives must be done for the right motives Acts 3:6
 - A. "In the name of Jesus Christ of Nazareth..." = not in Peter's or John's name.
 - B. Peter's goal was for God to use him so that he could give all the glory and honor to God.

Colossians 3:17

C. The temptation we face is to begin to seek praise, glory and honor instead of giving God his due.

Psalm 115:1

- 5. The potential impact we can make in the world demands that we make it a **priority**. Acts 3:7-10
 - A. The impact of Peter's actions
 - Christ can transform a person's life **instantly**

(Acts 3: 7)

• Christ can transform a person's life **completely**

(Acts 3: 8)

- B. When a person's life is transformed, it is a <u>witness</u> to those who have yet to be changed (Acts 3: 9-10)
- C. The potential impact we can make only occurs when we are first changed as a believer and as a church, and then when we attempt to change the world.
- 1. What does God need to change within you that may be potentially hindering your impact?
- 2. How many impactful moments do you let pass you by daily? Who are you ignoring or avoiding?
- 3. Has your agenda become the priority over God's business?
- 4. What does your impact log look like?
